Sundays and Weekdays in Ordinary Time/Of the Year 2021.

Next Monday, 11th January 2021, we begin what the Church Calendar calls 'Ordinary Time' or 'Of the Year'. Next Monday is Monday of the First Week in Ordinary Time.

Weekday Readings: Cycle 1. Sundays: Year B

Ordinary Time continues until Tuesday, 16th February, Tuesday of the 6th Week in Ordinary Time, Shrove Tuesday, the day before Ash Wednesday, the beginning of Lent.

Lent is followed by Easter (Easter Sunday: 4th April) and the weeks of Easter until Pentecost Sunday, 23rd May. Next day, Monday, 24th May is Monday of the 8th Week in Ordinary Time and the Memorial of the Blessed

Virgin Mary, Mother of the Church.

Ordinary Time then continues until Sunday, 28th November 2021, The First Sunday of Advent.

Green vestments, worn at Mass and other celebrations during Ordinary Time, are a sign of growth and a way of saying that we grow quietly in Ordinary Time, outside the high points of the Church's Seasons of Advent, Christmas, Lent and Easter.

Sunday of the Word of God: Sunday, 24th January.

Pope Francis has designated this 3rd Sunday in Ordinary Time each year as Sunday of the Word of God. The Word of God is proclaimed at each Mass. This Sunday gives us an opportunity to focus on the importance of the Word of God in our celebrations and in our lives. God continues to speak to us His Word. The door to the new year has opened. May the Word of God be our guiding light for 2021.

St. Joseph.

2021 - Year of St. Joseph.

On December 8th last Pope Francis gave us a year to focus on St. Joseph. On that day Pope Francis wrote a letter to the whole Church to mark the 150th anniversary of the naming of St. Joseph by Pope Pius IX as Patron of the Church throughout the world on December 8th, 1870.



Pope Francis's letter has the beautiful title: 'With a Father's Heart' (Patris Corde). With a father's heart, St. Joseph loved Jesus. He protected Jesus and Mary. The gospels tell us of the particular difficulties which the family faced when Jesus was born and of how Joseph had to

bring them to safety from those who wanted to harm the baby.

In his letter (footnote 10), Pope Francis included a prayer which he has prayed every evening for more than 40 years. He prays:

**Glorious Patriarch St. Joseph,
whose power makes the impossible possible,
come to my aid in these times of anguish and difficulty.**

**Take under your protection the serious and troubling situations
that I commend to you, that they may have a happy out come.**

My beloved father, all my trust is in you.

**Let it not be said that I invoked you in vain,
and since you can do everything with Jesus and Mary,
show me that your goodness is as great as your power. Amen.**
