



Carlo loved football, video games and had a sweet tooth, especially for Italian ice cream! He was from a well-off family who were not particularly religious. His mother revealed that she had not been to Mass three times in her life.

Carlo however used to attend Mass with other members of the family and once he saved up to buy a sleeping bag for a homeless man that he often saw on the way to the church.

He developed a true passion for the Eucharist which he called ‘his highway to heaven’ and at age 11 used his computer skills to create a website that traced the history of all known Eucharistic miracles that has been used by more than 10,000 parishes throughout the world (miracolieuucaristici.org) **He once asked his mother why sports stadiums were so full of people and churches so empty. He would say: ‘They have to see; they have to understand.’**

His mother became so taken by her son’s faith that she began a course in theology to help answer some of his many questions.

In his little notebook one day she saw that he had written: ‘Sadness is looking at oneself, happiness is looking at God.’ His mother then experienced a deep conversion herself. In the summer of 2006 Carlo asked his mother did she think he should become a priest and she told him that God would make it known to him.

When he went back to school he wasn’t feeling well and was diagnosed with a deadly form of leukaemia. He died shortly afterwards, and people were amazed at his funeral to see the number of the city’s poorer people who came to the ceremony and spoke of his generosity and kindness. His mother said, ‘he is being a priest from heaven.’

Carlo used to say to his young friends: ‘be an original not a photocopy’, encouraging them to be free of the slavery of the usual fads and fashions that so often led to unhappiness.

The Church of San Giuseppe in Molfetta, Italy has installed the first stained glass window depicting the 15-year-old with his trademark sneakers and rucksack and the reminder that **‘holiness is closer than we think.’**

October 7th: Our Lady of the Rosary.

“I invite you to pray the rosary, and to carry it in your hands or in your pockets. The recitation of the rosary is the most beautiful prayer we can offer to the Virgin Mary; it is a contemplation on the stages of the life of Jesus the Saviour with his Mother Mary and is a weapon that protects us from evils and temptations.”

The pope said that the Blessed Virgin Mary has urged the recitation of the rosary in her apparitions, “especially in the face of the threats looming over the world.”

“Even today, in this time of pandemic, it is necessary to hold the rosary in our hands, praying for us, for our loved ones and for all people,” he added.

October 10th: Blessed Carlo Acutis (3 May 1991 – 12 October 2006).

On 10 October 2020 in Assisi, Pope Francis beatified 15-year-old Carlo Acutis who died in 2006, making the teen the first of what we call the millennial generation to have been raised to the altar in this way.

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
