Autumn Collection: 18/19 September.

The Autumn Collection for the support of the priests of the parish will be taken up on the weekend of 18/19 September. The Birthday of Mary: Wednesday, September 8th.

Each church year we celebrate only three birthdays: Jesus, Mary and John the Baptist. Jesus is first. Mary and John the Baptist are celebrated because of their relationship to Jesus. Mary, in the words of today's gospel, 'will give birth to a son and you must name him Jesus, because he is the one who is to save his people from their sins.' John the Baptist is celebrated as the person who prepared the way for Jesus to begin his preaching.

The Holy Name of Mary: Sunday, September 12th.

Mary or Miriam means wished-for-child— a child wished for, not only by her parents, Joachim and Anne, but by the whole world. Mary, as the Litany of Loreto reminds us is the 'Cause of our Joy', in bringing the Son Of God into the world. And all generations call her blessed, because of what God did for Mary and for us in giving us Jesus our Saviour.

Our Lady of Sorrows: Wednesday, September 15

Jesus is lost in the Temple; Mary meets Jesus on the way to Calvary; Jesus dies on the Cross; Jesus is taken down from the Cross and is buried in the Tomb. In her sorrows we see Mary suffering with Jesus. These sorrows were foretold by Simeon when Mary and Joseph presented the baby Jesus in the temple when he said: 'A sword will pierce your own souls too.' (Luke 2:35) We can turn to Mary in our troubles and sorrows.

Our Lady of Mercy: Friday, September 24th.

St. Bernard of Clairvaux (1090 – 1153) tells us to call on Mary with devotion and she will not leave our needs unattended, since she is merciful, indeed she is the Mother of Mercy.'

These feasts and every feast of Mary throughout the year, celebrate Mary, the Mother of Jesus and our Mother too.


They bring her closer to us in celebrating her life with its joys and sorrows while giving an insight into Mary's life and her life with God forever.

Sunday, September 5th: Saint Teresa of Calcutta/ Mother Teresa of Calcutta. 1910 – 1997.

Mother Teresa said: 'By blood, I am Albanian. By citizenship, an Indian. By faith, I am a Catholic nun. As to my calling, I belong to the world. As to my heart, I belong entirely to the Heart of Jesus.'

'Mother Teresa liked to define herself as 'a pencil in the hand of the Lord'. But how many poems of charity, compassion, comfort and joy this little pencil was able to write! Poems of love and tenderness for the poorest of the poor, to whom she consecrated her existence.'

(Pope Francis, September 4, 2016, when Mother Teresa was declared a saint of the church.)



The Triumph of the Cross: Tuesday, September 14th.

'The words 'triumph' and 'cross' don't normally belong together. 'Triumph' suggests celebration, achievement, recognition. 'Cross' indicates suffering, humiliation, defeat. How could anyone who ended up crucified ever be said to have triumphed?....The triumph of the cross is the triumph of love over hatred, of life over death.'

St. Pio of Pietrelcina/Padre Pio (1887 – 1968): Thursday, September 23rd.

Padre Pio, a Capuchin Friar bore the wounds of Jesus (stigmata) from 1911 until his death. His daily work was hearing confessions, sometimes for 11 or 12 hours a day. Pope Paul VI said that to assist at Padre Pio's Mass was 'as effective as a preached retreat.' On June 16th, 2002, Pope John Paul II declared Padre Pio a saint of the church. He had often said: 'After my death I will do more. My real mission will begin after my death.'
