**Celebrating 72 years of the Angelus Bell on Radio.**

The broadcasting of the Angelus Bell celebrated its 72<sup>nd</sup> birthday in this August. It was first broadcast on August 17, 1950, on Radio Eireann from the Pro-Cathedral in Dublin. When RTE One opened on New Year's Eve 1961, the Angelus was broadcast, accompanied by religious images. These images were replaced in 2009 by non-religious images which encourage reflection and a pause for prayer. It is claimed that the three-three-three-nine format of bell strokes best suits the recitation of the prayers which make up the angelus. A devotion in honour of the Word Made Flesh, it takes its name from the first word of the prayer: Angelus means Angel.
