# Ash Wednesday, 14th February 2024 Remember you are Dust

Every Ash Wednesday, we wear ashes. We acknowledge the reality that every believer, atheist, scientist and mystic can all agree: 'we are dust and unto dust we will return.' It is a reminder that we will die. Yet Isaiah (61:3) tells us that a messenger would come 'to bestow on us a crown of beauty instead of ashes, the oil of gladness instead of mourner's tears and a garment of praise instead of a heavy heart.'

Ashes remind us that we are not spared death—but that the power of death has been defeated. There is a moving ritual in the burial service of various Christian churches and other faith traditions, in which the priest (Minister) and then the chief mourners, if they wish, let a handful of earth fall onto the coffin. For mourners who remember hearing the scriptures, this ritual has a special significance, as the Genesis words: 'Dust you are and unto dust you will return' are intoned. Here, God seals our mortality. The words evoke our solidarity with one another and with all of humankind in our shared experience.

Genesis contains a promise that the serpent will be crushed (3:15). That promise was fulfilled when Christ, in complete solidarity with us, went down to the dust and defeated death on our behalf. 'As in Adam all die, so in Christ all will be made alive.' (1 Cor 15:22)

# Trócaire Box 2024: Climate Change: Malawi

### Malawi: The warm Heart of Africa

Malawi is a country with extremely high levels of poverty, where life is already a struggle for many. Climate change means flooding and droughts are becoming more unpredictable. People are losing their homes, their livelihoods and even their lives. You can support communities to build resilience. To prepare for the devastation that could arrive any day.

#### Working together for the Future

After destructive cyclone in Malawi last year, Trócaire worked with local partners to repair over 50 boreholes, restoring vital access to water for communities. With a focus on sustainability, solar powered water pumps have been installed in 12 communities across Malawi. Your generosity could mean many more families have access to clean fresh and safe water.

#### Too little water and the Children miss school.

Malita's children, Patrick and Patricia, spend hours every day fetching water. A lack of rain means the maize that Malita plants withers in the ground, leaving her family hungry. You can help her adapt with drought-resistant crops.

#### Too much water and the family's livelihood is destroyed.

Sudden floodwaters can wash away the crops and any nutrients in the soil, leaving families like Malita's with nothing and no hope for a harvest in the next season. You can help communities shore up vital flood defences.

## Lent: Points to Ponder

Even though the Church no longer asks us to observe the severe Lenten penances of former times, it is surely fitting that we make some form of preparation. It should be a time for personal reflection on where we stand as Christians. Only a little reflection will convince us that, on the one hand, there are many ways in which we fail through word and actions, through our thoughts and through our failure to be the kind of people that the Gospel challenges us to be.

But our reflections should not only focus on the negative.

What are the positive things which should be a part of my daily life? What kind of a person am I in relation to my family friends, working colleagues and other people with whom I come in contact?

How active am I as a member of Christian community e.g my parish? What difference do I make to other peoples lives?

What do I do, within my limitations, to help eradicate the abuses which are part of our society?

These are just some of the questions I can ask myself during these six weeks.

And it is never too late to get started. Let us not rigidly think that, because Ash Wednesday has already come and gone, I cannot start today.
