

In the Gospel today we hear Jesus speak to the Pharisees about what holiness really is.

- What is the Holy Spirit saying to you through this piece of Scripture? How do these words resonate with you personally?
- "This people honours me with their lips; but their hearts are far from me." As you pray with these words, reflect on the state of your own heart when you practice your faith.
- Is your heart open and attentive when you go to Mass? Is there love and mercy in your heart towards others? Are there parts of your heart that need healing? Is there anyone in your life you need to forgive?
- Spend some time with Jesus this week reflecting on these questions

- In this week's Gospel, we witness Jesus having a disagreement with the Pharisees. We hear Jesus criticize the Pharisees for making their rules about ritual purity equal to the commandments of God's Law. They were not focusing on what it really meant to be holy.
- What are some of the rules our family sets? Chat about them. Do they ever seem unfair? Why are those rules in place? Is it because our parents want to be unfair and mean to us, or is it because they love us and want us to be good and do well in life?
- When we remember the essential element behind our rules, we see that our rules help us be the good people that Jesus wants us to be.
- Jesus wants us to focus on the rules that matter, the ones that will help us get to heaven!

Family Challenge!



Jesus wants us to be loving to those around us, even when it's really hard! He sees every effort we make, because He sees into our hearts. This week, make a special effort to be nice to someone who annoys you. Jesus will help you if you ask!

HOLINESS COMES FROM WITHIN

In today's Gospel, Mark provides a significant amount of information about the Jewish observance of ritual-purity laws. Most scholars believe that Mark includes this information because his audience includes Gentile Christians who have no knowledge or experience of these laws. We can infer, therefore, that many in Mark's community were not Jewish Christians.

Jesus first criticizes the Pharisees for putting human tradition above God's Law. Here, Jesus is referring to the tradition of the elders, the teachings of the Pharisees, which extended the ritualpurity laws of Temple worship to everyday Jewish life. Jesus criticizes the Pharisees for making this tradition equal to and as binding as the Law of Moses.

Next, Jesus comments on the meaning behind the Pharisees' language of holiness—clean and unclean. Jesus teaches that a person is not defiled by the food that enters his or her body, but rather by sin that emerges from his or her words and actions. In this teaching, Jesus unmasks a deeper question behind the one posed to him by the Pharisees. The real issue is holiness, which is not found in external acts alone. Holiness comes from within and is evidenced in the actions and attitudes that emerge from a person's life.

Jesus' words challenge us as well. In our desire to show that we are holy, we might also give too much credence to externals, following rules without thinking about the intention behind them. Jesus reminds us that we do not make ourselves holy by our actions. Rather, we become holy when we allow God's Spirit to transform us. Our actions should be an expression of the conversion of our heart to God and to God's ways.
