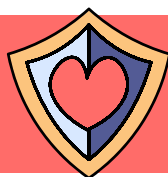
Reflect



In the Gospel today we witness Jesus' appearance to the disciples in the upper room, and Thomas' declaration of the Lordship of Jesus.

- What is the Holy Spirit saying to you through this piece of Scripture? How do these words resonate with you personally?
- "Peace be with you." These are Jesus' words in today's Gospel. Take some time, silently, to recall moments in your life where you have doubted Jesus, like Thomas. Reflect on times in the past where it was difficult to see Jesus' presence with you.
- Looking at those situations now, can you see how Jesus was working in your life to show you how much He loves you?

In today's Gospel we see that Thomas didn't find it easy to trust in the resurrection of Jesus until he witnessed it with his own eyes.

- What kind of things do we need to see to believe? What kind of things do we believe without seeing?
- What kind of things do our family and friends say to us to help us when we are afraid or worried?
- Make a list of who you can turn to when you feel anxious or have doubts about your faith.
- If we keep our eyes on Jesus we don't need to be worried or afraid. Make a conscious effort this week to hand over any worries or fears to Jesus straight away!

BELIEVE WITHOUT SEEING

The Gospels tell us that Jesus appeared to the disciples on several occasions after they discovered that his tomb was empty. Part of the mystery of Jesus' Resurrection is that he appeared to his disciples not as a spirit but in bodily form. The bodily form was not one that the disciples recognized though. In John's Gospel, Mary of Magdala does not recognize that the figure standing before her is Jesus until he speaks to her. In Luke's Gospel the disciples who meet Jesus on the road to Emmaus do not recognize him until he breaks bread with them. The resurrected Jesus had a physical presence, but the disciples couldn't recognize Jesus unless he allowed them to. His resurrected body, nonetheless, showed the marks of his crucifixion.

From readings such as today's Gospel, we also see that in his resurrected body, Jesus seems to be free of physical constraints. He appears to the disciples despite the fact that the doors were locked.

Jesus greets his disciples with the gift of peace and the gift of the Holy Spirit. In doing so, Jesus commissions his disciples to continue the work that he has begun: "As the Father has sent me, so I send you." During the meeting, Jesus also shows the integral connection between forgiveness of sins and the gift of the Holy Spirit.

The story of Thomas illustrates our Christian experience today: We are called to believe without seeing. In fact, all Christians after the first witnesses have been called to believe without seeing. Thomas's doubt is hardly surprising; the news of Jesus' appearance was incredible to the disciples who had seen him crucified and buried. Thomas's human nature compelled him to want hard evidence that the Jesus who appeared to the disciples after his death was indeed the same Jesus who had been crucified. Thomas is given the opportunity to act on that desire. He is our witness that Jesus is really risen. Our faith is based on the witness of the Church that has preceded us, beginning with Thomas and the first disciples. Through Baptism we receive the same Holy Spirit that Jesus brought to the first disciples. We are among those who are "blessed" because we believe without having seen.

ABC OF DIVINE MERCY

Today we celebrate the second Sunday of Easter, also known as Divine Mercy Sunday, inspired by the message of Divine Mercy revealed to Saint Faustina by Jesus in a series of apparitions to the nun in Poland in the 1930s.



The message of The Divine Mercy is simple: God loves us and He wants us to truly know that His mercy is greater than our sins, so that we will call upon Him with trust, receive His mercy, and let it flow through us to others. "The greater the sinner, the greater the right he has to My mercy." (723) Use ABC to help you remember the message!

- Ask for His Mercy. God wants us to be sorry for our sins and ask Him to pour His mercy out on us and upon the whole world.
- Be merciful. God wants us to receive His mercy and in turn be merciful to other.
- Completely trust in Jesus. "The more a soul trusts, the more it will receive." (1578)
